

This assists funds flow to communities most in need, including yours.

Peak's retainer-based service includes options that ensure that your Council's projects requiring funding are monitored in line with each new grant opening based on your current need, including grant sourcing and access to Peak's grant writing expertise.

Our tiers of support are flexible can be adjusted depending on how involved you need us to be. Mornington Shire Council – Grant Program Management & Grant Writing Support

Peak's partnership with Mornington Island Council has helped drive a strategic approach and secure over \$10 million in grant funding over the past few years. Successful projects funded include (but are not limited to) the \$5.3m multi-purpose cyclone shelter, radio network, fuel facility upgrade and NAIDOC week events.

Peak has recently been involved in establishing a sound platform of qualitative and quantitative evidence to demonstrate the issue and opportunities on the Island. This has helped formed a knowledge bank of grant writing and communications materials to complement priority projects and bolster the quality of funding applications.

Balonne Shire Council - Grant Program Management & Grant Writing Support

For the past 12 months, Peak has helped Balonne Shire Council deliver on its grants and funding goals. Balonne Shire Council's grants program was already well established, with good systems and processes in place to ensure they maximised funding opportunities. However, when a key employee was going on leave, Peak was called upon to ensure the flow of priority projects could be matured and funded, and reporting requirements were kept on track.

Peak's Grants Team worked on varying areas for Balonne Shire Council including:

- Communicating current funding opportunities
- Assessing grant eligibility requirements against priority project lists
- Application writing for community events, agricultural initiatives, and community infrastructure
- Developing additional supporting documentation and reports required to strengthen the applications, such as project plans, programs, cost benefit analysis, strategy alignment and socio-economic data

- Monitoring and completing milestone reports and acquittals.

Peak has so far helped Balonne Shire Council secure funding for Flood Gauges & Cameras worth over half a million dollars, the Backpackers and Residents Festival and CCTV Cameras.

Ranger Station Development - Mapoon Aboriginal Shire Council

Peak assisted Council with their application for Building Our Regions Round 5 funding. The project to be funded is a business case for a new Ranger Station development in the Mapoon CBD, which will be a high use area and focal point for visitors.

The project will complement other tourism development including the proposed expansion of short stay accommodation complex and planned Cultural Centre in the main street. Council anticipates a significant increase in visitor numbers when it launches its first tourism marketing campaign at the Cape York Tourism Promotion in Cooktown 2020. Council will have a strong presence at this event which is specifically designed to market the very Far North to self-drive travellers.

The project will address the economic growth opportunity of sustaining and creating jobs by employing Councils construction and civil works teams during the construction phase.

Multicultural Indigenous Precinct - Hinchinbrook Shire Council

Peak assisted Council with their application for Building Our Regions Round 5 funding. The project to be funded is to develop a business case for Hinchinbrook Shire Multicultural Indigenous Precinct.

The scope is to include the development of an authentic multicultural and indigenous precinct in the town centre area of Ingham to enhance the shires credentials as a recreation, adventure and tourism mecca.

Although the final design is dependent on the site, the proposed planning outcome will include a built structure to provide the anchor point, it will include interpretive cultural displays and digital experiences as well as providing shelter and amenities.

It is an initiative that will advance and aligns with Council's vision to improve recreation and tourism in the region by promoting the shires natural wonders, culture and history.



The intention is for the cultural and aboriginal precinct to revitalise the centre of the Ingham township, increase visitor stopping and subsequently spend in the region along with promoting an area currently experiencing an economic slump and by increasing its visitor exposure incentivise development.



Barra Discovery Centre - Carpentaria Shire Council

Peak assisted Council with their application for Building Our Regions Round 5 funding. The project to be funded is for a business case for expansion of the existing Barra Discovery Centre at Karumba by redeveloping the old hatchery site to support future tours/experiences such as Catch-n-Release and Catch-n-Keep.

This redevelopment includes:

- Two large ponds for the catch and release (to alternate and rest fish stock if needed).
- Construction of two grow-out ponds for the barramundi fingerlings
- Reception area (structure already existing)
- Landscaping
- Car parking

Ranger Station Development - Mapoon Aboriginal Shire Council

Peak assisted Council with their application for Building Our Regions Round 5 funding. The project to be funded is a business case for a new Ranger Station development in the Mapoon CBD, which will be a high use area and focal point for visitors.

The project will complement other tourism development including the proposed expansion of short stay accommodation complex and planned Cultural Centre in the main street.

The project will address economic growth opportunity of sustaining and creating jobs by employing Council's construction and civil works teams during the construction phase.

Business Centre - Kowanyama Aboriginal Shire Council

Peak assisted Council with their application for Building Our Regions Round 5 funding. The project to be funded is to prepare a business case for a new Business Centre for Kowanyama Aboriginal Shire Council.


Once constructed the building will provide a workspace for Council Administration, Council Chambers, offices for use by external service providers and microbusinesses, and a Disaster Management Coordination Centre.

The Business Centre is a priority infrastructure for Kowanyama Aboriginal Shire and is critical to creating a modern business centre. It meets community needs identified in the Corporate Plan 2018-23: it supports council business; provides quality infrastructure; consolidates the town centre; gives greater access to services; improves governance and communications; improves the general appearance of township; fosters community participation and involvement.

Sewer Infrastructure - Gympie Regional Council

Gympie Regional Council has been successful in securing over \$3.5 million dollars in Local Government Grants Subsidy Program (LGGSP) funding for the Southside Residential New Sewer Infrastructure Project which will allow for the construction of sewerage reticulation mains in the established areas of Southside, Gympie - to provide existing properties with failing onsite treatment to connect to Council's sewer network.

We managed this application through the Grants Management Program, understanding the priority projects within the Local Government Area, and working with the executive as well as individual business units ensures the continuity of applications, and assists in the success of the projects.









24% Of BoR6 Funding Secured by Peak on Behalf of 10 Queensland Councils

38 Queensland councils received their share of \$60 million in funding from Round 6 Building our Regions (BoR) - Infrastructure Stream.

This funding program focuses on delivering enduring economic outcomes for regional communities, with infrastructure projects that create jobs that will improve local economic conditions and liveability.

Peak Services is proud to showcase a 100% success rate assisting 10 Queensland councils to secure \$15,778,648 across 20 separate EOIs and completed applications.

Carpentaria Shire Council

\$40,000

Water Reservoir Upgrade

\$1,992,917

This project aims to undertake works to upgrade the ground reservoirs at Normanton Water Treatment to increase capacity to ensure continuity of water supply for the residents of Carpentaria Shire.

Carpentaria Shire Council

Glenore Weir Water Pipe Replacement

\$295,000

This project will undertake planning work to upgrade the existing water pipeline in Carpentaria Shire, running from the Glenore Weir to the Normanton Water Treatment Plant, some 23 kilometres in distance. This pipeline provides the raw water supply for the townships of Normanton and Karumba and is essential for ongoing water security.

Burke Shire Council

Smart Water Meter Project

\$842,875

This project looked at upgrading the old mechanical water meters in Gregory and Burketown to new Smart Water Meters and an Intelligent Water Network.

This enables the townships to improve their water supply security, by mitigating water loss and enhancing water demand management. Remote monitoring allows Council to respond faster to maintenance issues and reduce unnecessary travel time during the wet season. The benefits to Council and community are a more efficient service, employee safety, customer empowerment and ultimately greater revenue.

Burke Shire Council

Burke Shire and Doomadgee Aboriginal Shire Water Security Strategy

\$485,000

This important project will allow the Burke Shire and Doomadgee Aboriginal Shire to develop a comprehensive water security strategy to ensure the sustainability of drinking water for both shires that share the same river catchments. The strategy will involve water source options analysis; address the effects of drought, floods and climate change; a demand



management plan; water demand projections; water restrictions and emergency water supply trigger points; and an emergency water supply plan.

Burke Shire Council

Gregory Water Treatment Plant Upgrade

\$1.211.310

This project focuses on upgrades to the Gregory Water Treatment Plant (GWTP). Ultimately the upgrades are aimed at improving the GWTP's ability to produce high quality drinking water, more efficiently and reliably.

The outcome of undertaking this upgrade will be to provide a more resilient and automated water treatment plant that will provide greater reliability of the quality control for the drinking water in the very remote community of Gregory.

Gympie Regional Council

Southside Residential Infill Sewer Project (Stage 8)

\$1.322.922

This project is Stage 8 of the Southside Residential Infill Sewer Project. The project will construct sewerage reticulation mains in the established areas of Southside, Gympie. The project will allow existing properties to connect to Council's sewer network. This project allows Council to mitigate health and environmental risks associated with the ageing onsite septic treatment systems currently utilised in this area. This project also allows Council to deliver on their future growth and development strategies.

Gympie Regional Council

Gympie Jones Hill Reservoir Upgrade

\$650,000

This project will construct a new above ground water reservoir to replace the ageing Jones Hill Underground Water Reservoir, in Gympie Shire, which has reached end of life. The reservoir is critical to the production of potable water for the main Water Treatment Plant in Gympie. This project will also augment potable water storage for the Southside Sewerage Project, a program to construct and operate reticulated sewerage networks in the local area to allow connection for residents and to phase out the septic systems.

Kowanyama Aboriginal **Shire Council**

Kowanyama Essential Services Facility

\$650.000

This project involves the construction of an integrated essential services facility to house all water and sewerage operations. The integrated facility would include the following key essential operational facilities and activities: A A dedicated laboratory room; Chlorine storage; Storage of water and sewerage consumable pipework/fittings; and, Essential services vehicles and equipment security. This project will protect and better coordinate all Councils' essential water services equipment services and operations.

Ouilpie Shire Council

Toompine Town Bore Replacement

The project will replace the existing 1918 circa failing town bore with a new bore, cooling ponds and pumping infrastructure to provide greater service capacity for the region's water supply to meet the current and future needs of the region.

Quilpie Shire Council

Quilpie Sewage Treatment Plant Replacement

\$299.965

Ouilpie Shire Council was successful in their planning application to upgrade and construct a new Sewerage Treatment Plant. The existing plant has reached the end of its life and is failing; too much organic load is reaching the waterways, and this needed to be rectified. The new treatment plant will offer the Shire enhanced agricultural irrigation, odour reduction and future security in the system that will be capable of higher demand periods during peak tourist seasons.

Barcoo Shire Council

Jundah Water Treatment Plant Replacement

\$248.041

This project involves developing a detailed Jundah Water Treatment Plant replacement plan. This project will develop detailed designs and costings for the most suitable options for a long-term water security solution for the Barcoo region, which covers an area of 61,974 square kilometres in far Western Queensland.

Balonne Shire Council

Balonne Water Security and Cooling Plan

\$300.000

This project will engage a Consultant Hyrodolgist to develop a business case, conduct community consultation, develop detailed designs and costings for the most suitable options for a long-term water security solution for the Balonne Shire. This important planning project will result in a shovel ready best option project for future funding opportunities.

Water Security Study

This project will plan a long term water security solution to improve liveability and amenity on Mornington Island and importantly solve the critical need to address water shortages on the Island. Specifically, this project will investigate raising the dam wall. This project will improve water security and provide economic benefits through retained employment, tourism and meet the needs of future planned developments in agriculture and tourism. As a very remote community, having water security and high-quality water supply is critical for maintaining community wellbeing, health and future growth.



Three Out of Three Regional Connectivity Program Projects Funded

Following the release of the Commonwealth Government's Regional Connectivity Program (RCP) in 2020, Peak's Grants Team was contacted by three remote councils who wanted their communities to have access to affordable, fast and reliable mobile and internet services that RCP funded projects could offer. But they were unsure how to go about sourcing a suitable telecommunications provider to access the funding and secure a project in their region.

Peak's team then took over the process – from advertising the opportunity on the RCP notice board, liaising with potential telecommunication providers, accessing their suitability and experience in remote areas, as well as matching the communities' needs to the services the telcos could offer. Peak's team then took its recommendations back to the councils to let them decide which potential applicant was the best fit for their individual needs.

The grants team then acted as a liaison between the individual councils and their preferred supplier to ensure the applications represented the issues and opportunities on the ground, including cost benefit analysis and articulating the social, safety and health benefits the projects could afford these communities.



On 16 April 2021, the Deputy Prime Minister, the Hon Michael McCormack MP, the Minister for Communications, Urban Infrastructure, Cities and the Arts, the Hon Paul Fletcher MP, and the Minister for Regional Health, Regional Communications and Local Government, the Hon Mark Coulton MP, announced that 81 communications infrastructure projects had been funded throughout Australia under the RCP.

All three applications Peak was involved in were successfully funded. These projects will provide people in these communities to access essential online services, assisting them to utilise new business tools and connect with the digital economy.

The largest of the three successful projects is in Mornington Shire, where Telstra secured \$2,661,731 to deliver a project to upgrade the capacity of the existing Telstra 4GX mobile facility in the Indigenous community of Gununa on Mornington Island. The project will also upgrade the existing fibre network between Mount Isa and Point Parker, and deploy a new mobile site near Century Mine, to provide microwave backhaul capacity to Mornington Island. The upgrades will support the delivery of government services, as well as health and education resources. Improved connectivity will also support expanded business opportunities in cultural and fishing tourism.

Barcoo Shire Council secured \$101,873 to support Telstra's 4GX mobile base station east of Stonehenge. The new base station will address a coverage black spot on the Thomson Development Road and will increase coverage on the Stonehenge to Yaraka Road, improving traveller safety, emergency communications and freight monitoring.

Field Solutions Group was successful in gaining \$356,908 to deploy a fixed wireless network in the Cape York town of Napranum. The network will enable the efficient delivery of essential services, such as health, education, public safety and cultural heritage initiatives by the Napranum Aboriginal Shire Council.

Brian Jackson, Director Peak Consulting Services, says it's so important for councils to provide access to reliable internet services which are essential for community members performing basic, everyday tasks. "It's projects like these that make a big difference to councils' ability to foster their communities. Reliable internet is essential in everyday life for simple tasks like banking and paying bills. Importantly, these communities can also access online learning, health services and stay in touch with loved ones. Recently, COVID has made us all more reliant on the internet at work and socially. Now, these communities can benefit from what most of us take for granted. This is a great example of Peak's breadth and depth of experience working with governments, communities and industry can deliver to advance our remote councils."



Mount Isa City Council Successful in Highly Competitive BBRF

Mount Isa City Council was one of the 104 successful applicants across Australia who were offered funding under the highly competitive Building Better Regions Fund (BBRF), Community Investments stream for round 5. Peaks Grant Team managed the submission to secure Council over \$500,000 in funding to deliver an event that will celebrate the 100 year anniversary of the discovery of minerals in the City.

Successful applicants in the BBRF community stream secured an average amount of funding just over \$55,000, so this is a big win for this historic City.

Today, Mount Isa and North West Queensland is one of the most productive minerals provinces in the world, mining and processing lead, silver, copper and zinc and other minerals worth billions of dollars to the Australian economy. Mount Isa has grown from Australia's first 'company town' into one of the largest and most important industrial powerhouses in the nation, the region also produces some of the country's best beef. Residents are extremely proud of their mining history and significant economic contributions. This project celebrates Mount Isa's strong sense of identity and community.

The 100 Year Celebrations will build on local strengths, such as the world class Rodeo, the natural landscape, fossil trails, natural parks and cultural heritage, to provide real economic and social outcomes for Mount Isa and the wider region through vibrant outback events. Mount Isa's world famous Rodeo in 2019 attracted 40,000 attendees, raised \$6M in funds for charity and generated \$12.24 million in tourist spending.

While Council is not giving too much away they are promising their celebrations will feature big name talents as well as provide past residents with an opportunity to reconnect.

In a media statement released from Council, Mount Isa 100 Years Advisory Committee Chair, Councillor Peta MacRae said the funding would be used to build on Mount Isa's flagship events in 2023, the city's centennial year.

"We have a range of fantastic events and activities planned for the whole of 2023 to showcase the rich history of Mount Isa and celebrate what makes the city and its community great, as befitting its centenary year," Cr MacRae said.

"We anticipate the 100-year reunion dinner will be a gala-style event that will attract people who once lived in the city back to Mount Isa.

"The Founders' Day Underground Experience at Outback at Isa aims to tell stories from Traditional Owners about the country and people before Mount Isa was established and feature long-term residents' stories of 'back in the day'.

"We see the Mount Isa 100 Years Celebrations as not just promoting Mount Isa and the region as a tourism destination and great place to live to people across Australia, but also celebrating Indigenous culture, and increasing community pride and social inclusion," said Cr MacRrae.

The 100 Years Celebrations aims to bring many visitors to Mount Isa as part of the community and economic recovery planning. North West Queensland has been hit particularly hard in recent times. The North West Queensland Monsoon Trough Flooding in 2019 impacted critical transport infrastructure and regional productivity. Major events were not held in 2020 due to the Coronavirus restrictions.

The event will offer the opportunity for Mount Isa's diverse multicultural population to leverage the event by showcasing and selling its products. As a result, this project will benefit residents, local businesses and the wider region and tourism corridors such as the Overlanders Way.

As the Grants Program Officer Leader, Zoe Dark, I led the submission and have a very strong connection to Mount Isa, having called it home for 10 years and was extremely pleased for Council success.

It's great news for Mount Isa. The hardworking, patriotic locals have a proud history of coming together and supporting each other in hard times.

Our team did a fantastic job capturing the project's narrative and qualifying and quantifying the social and economic benefits.

A portion of Mount Isa's population are transient, many residents are far from family and friends, events such as the 100 Years Celebrations are critical to enable community connections and social inclusion. I can't wait to return to the City in 2023.



Celebrating working with Laynhapuy Homelands Aboriginal Corporation

Finding support and project wins in East Arnhem Land



The homelands movement is a proud and historic initiative of Yolngu (local people), inspired by clan elders, who sought to determine their own future, conduct affairs according to Yolngu 'lore', and live and raise their families on their traditional Land.

In April 1972, following decades in various missions, Yolngu senior elders and their extended family began to move away from the Yirrkala Mission and the expanding mining town and back to their clan land around Arnhem Land. Their vision being to develop sustainable, self-sufficient homelands.

With the help of Ngapaki (non-Indigenous people) from the Mission, Yolngu build their homes using trees from their land and cleared land for airstrips.

Laynhapuy Homelands Aboriginal Corporation (LHAC or 'Laynha') was established in 1985 and enjoys a proud history of supporting Yolngu to live on their traditional clan land. With some 30 homeland communities, Laynha provides health, community, homeland, housing and infrastructure services to a population of approximately 1100 Yolngu residents and approximately 300 regular visitors. This support extends to Yirrkala Rangers Land and Sea Management in East Arnhem Land – 33,310 square kilometres in the far north-east corner of the Northern Territory.

Like most First Nations communities, it is very difficult to develop sustainable own source revenue to meet the most basic of human needs and as a result there is a heavy reliance on the various funding streams to deliver the much needed community services to support housing, health, and critical infrastructure.

Peak Services Grants Program Office has been working with LHAC to strengthen their funding applications and manage their grants program. This partnership has already proven incredibly successful, with funding secured for 13 projects, a combined value of over \$15 million dollars, and a further 11 applications pending decision. These funds help Laynha deliver essential services to these remote homeland communities.

Two successful applications under the National Indigenous Australians Agencies', Aboriginals Benefit Account Open Grant

Opportunity were recently secured for the installation and commissioning of a Hybrid Solar power system. The projects involve the design, supply, installation, and commission of a Hybrid Solar power system in both Gangan and Baniyala and aim to provide the community with a robust and resilient power supply to improve access to essential services, health, hygiene, and well-being.

Power is currently provided by noisy, expensive diesel generators, and supply is unreliable, particularly during the wet season when access to fuel trucks is limited. This Hybrid Solar power system will contribute long-term financial savings to the community, provide cleaner, more reliable power for residents and services, and provide employment opportunities for the community as a local team will be trained to maintain the new equipment.

Another great result stemming from the Laynha-Peak partnership was the recent announcement that 9 out of 9 applications submitted to the Homelands Housing, Municipal and Essential Services Grant Capital Funding program were successful.

The projects submitted for funding involved over 50 bodies of work across Laynha's some 30 homeland communities. With lots of moving parts, Peak's Grants team worked closely with Laynha to break down the works and package them into 9 applications to increase value for money and capacity to deliver - contributing to Laynha's chance of success.

Projects will contribute to improved health and environmental outcomes across some 30 homeland communities. These projects range from:

- Building fit-for-purpose waste management systems to ensure efficient and environmental disposal of waste
- Sewerage upgrades to provide effluent designated areas
- Installation of toilets and showers over half the houses do not have access to their own flush toilet and need to use a pit toilet
- Replacement of end-of-life bore pumps with energy-efficient solar power pumps
- Installation of solar power hot water systems
- Roof replacements, and
- Upgrading existing power mains at airstrips.
